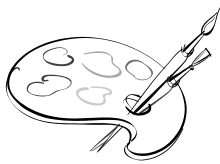

Mountain Lion Awareness

The Pinery HOA has received three mountain lion reports from the eastern half of the Pinery. The following information is from the Colorado Division of Wildlife.

When Mountain Lions Meet People

Generally, lions are calm, quiet, and elusive. They tend to live in remote, primitive country. Lions are most commonly found in areas with plentiful deer and adequate cover. Such conditions exist in mountain subdivisions, urban fringes, and open spaces. Consequently, the number of mountain lion/human interactions has increased. This increase is likely due to a variety of reasons: more people moving into lion habitat, increase in deer populations and density, presumed increase in lion numbers and expanded range, more people using hiking and running trails in lion habitat and a greater awareness of the presence of lions.

What to do if you live in lion country

To reduce the risk of problems with mountain lions on or near your property, we urge you follow these simple precautions:

Make lots of noise if you come and go during times mountain lions are most active- dusk to dawn.

Install outside lighting. Light areas where you walk so you could see a lion if one were present.

Closely supervise children whenever they play outdoors. Make sure children are inside before dusk and not outside before dawn. Talk with children about lions and teach them what to do if they meet one.

Landscape or remove vegetation to *eliminate hiding places for lions*, especially around children's play areas. Make it difficult for lions to approach unseen.

Planting non-native shrubs and plants that deer often prefer to eat encourages wildlife to come onto your property. Predators follow prey. ***Feeding the wildlife is dangerous and illegal!***

Keep your pet under control. Roaming pets are easy prey and can attract lions. Bring pets in at night. If you leave your pet outside, keep it in a kennel with a secure top. Don't feed pets outside; this can attract raccoons and other

animals that are eaten by lions. Store all garbage securely.

Who do you call?


The Colorado Division of Wildlife is responsible for managing, conserving, and protecting wildlife.

If you have an encounter with a lion, immediately contact the Division of Wildlife, Monday-Friday, 8 a.m.- 5 p.m.- 303-291-7227. After hours, contact the Colorado State Patrol or Sheriff's department.

To report a sighting, please contact the Division during normal business hours. Your information is very valuable.

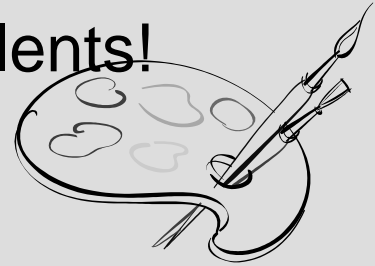

NEWS FROM THE WATER BOARD



While the cold of January and February 2006 may seem like a distant memory with the warm temperatures of spring, There is an issue that caused the District staff a lot of work this past year. We had a large number of calls for frozen pipes and no service that were the result of frozen water meters and service lines. This is a good time to familiarize yourself with the location of your water meter and where the main shut off is for your house. The staff of the District has been checking out the water meter lids to ensure that the insulation plate is in place and everything is operational. You, the members of the District, will need to check your shut off valves and service within your house. The District

staff can assist you if needed. Just call the District main number and let them know what assistance you need.

Spring and Summer Watering

Check your sprinkler systems to ensure that they are operating properly. With the warm, dry spring we have had, proper operation of your sprinkler systems will ensure that you get maximum efficiency for each gallon of water used to irrigate your lawn and landscaping. The Water Board does not anticipate placing any water usage limitations again this year, but we would encourage District members to follow these guidelines:

- water when the wind is not blowing
- Water in the early morning or early evenings

ensure that sprinklers do not water driveways or sidewalks excessively

While there are no limitations on water use, we still need to be wise in our use of this valuable resource.

Slash/Mulch Program Helps to Prevent Wildfires
every Saturday from May 27 to September 2
8 a.m. to 1 p.m.

Each year Douglas County implements a Slash/Mulch program to reduce, reuse and recycle slash- dead limbs, trees and brush. Materials will be accepted every Saturday from May 27 to September 2 from 8 a.m. to 1 p.m. Mulch is created from the slash and then provided to residents free of charge.

Residents can drop off tree branches and shrubbery that are no longer than six feet in length and 12 inches in diameter to the

Plum Creek Wastewater Authority at 1400 Caprice Dr. in Castle Rock. **All loads must be covered and tied.**

Unacceptable items include: stumps or roots, lumber, ties, grass or dirt, household trash, appliances and weeds.

The Pinery Architectural Control Committee

Crash Course in Trash

You may be unaware that covenants in the Pinery require storage of trash containers at the rear of the residence, *out of view of the frontage road* (except for trash service day of course). If you currently store your containers in view of the street, please make other arrangements, such as in the garage or in the back of the house.

With the trash program now allowing one free large item to be picked up per month, please do not place the item street side sooner than the night before service day.

We suggest that all trash be bagged before being put in the container. With the extreme wind we experience, this will

help ensure that your trash does not escape when the trash company empties your container into the truck. With all the wildlife in the Pinery (*including at times bears and mountain lions*) we urge you to keep your trash on the interior of your residence other than on service day.

And finally, a representative of the Post Office has asked that we remind residents that mailboxes must be accessible to ensure delivery. Make sure that on trash service day, your trash containers or bags do not block the mailbox.

The Pinery Architectural Control Committee in 2005

The Pinery Architectural Control Committee continues its work to maintain the standard of quality and beauty we all appreciate here in the Pinery. In 2005, the committee initiated a program to recognize exceptional landscaping with the Pinery Yard of the Month award. Homes are recognized with a photo and yard sign in the *Pinery Homeowner*.

The Pinery ACC is comprised of seven members who are elected for alternate two-year terms. Election for three or four positions is held each April. The ACC meets the first Tuesday of every month (unless otherwise announced via this newsletter) at 6:30 p.m. in the Community Room of the Pinery Fire Station. The Pinery ACC has covenant enforcement responsibility for Pinery Filings 1 through 8A, Fairway Ridge and Pinery Estates, almost 1900 properties.

The committee serves without compensation. ACC office hours are Tuesday through Thursday 9 a.m. to 3 p.m. The office is also staffed on Fridays prior to ACC meetings.

In an effort to address homeowner issues as quickly as possible at meetings, homeowner submittals are reviewed from 6:30 to 7:30 p.m. Review of builder submittals begins at 7:30 p.m. or when homeowner reviews are concluded. Submittals received by noon on the Friday before receive priority handling at the meeting.

Bird Sanctuary News

Bird Sanctuary Project Seeks Your Opinion About Our Site

Years ago, with PHA's blessing I was allowed to start a volunteer project on PHA land next to Northeast Elementary. The project was designed to provide habitat for diminishing numbers of songbirds in our area. It has evolved to be many things, but the original purpose remains the same. Currently, the board is discussing giving the project a more formal organization, with a budget and a committee. I am willing to help start the committee, provided the homeowners still support the original concept. With that in mind, please read the following synopsis of our project, and call the office to let us know how you feel about how this land is being used. Thank you ahead of time for

your interest.

The Pinery Bird Sanctuary is intended primarily to provide habitat for songbirds in our area. As such, the focus is to create a healthy field with plants that will serve the needs of these animals: food, shelter and nesting sites. A manicured, landscaped look is not the intent. Structure is being kept at a minimum for maintenance and security reasons. During the course of the project, we have dealt with noxious weeds and asphalt on the site, which I believe supports our philosophy of using native, xeric plants. Also notable is our avoidance of the use of chemicals in the area, as birds are very sensitive to them. We have come to realize

how the project builds community spirit, providing educational and volunteer opportunities for anyone who is interested in them. Once our initial plantings were installed, the complexity of the project varied from minimal maintenance to expansion. With our current funds and volunteer availability, we are in the minimal maintenance mode! Should that change, things could flourish and expand to whatever extent our resources allow. This is your land, so please let us know how you feel about our intent, and where we ought to go.

Trash Flash!!

In meeting with Waste Advantage following the first two weeks of the new trash program, it is clear to the Pinery Homeowners' Association that Waste Advantage intends to make this the best program it

can possibly be. In a given month, there are over 8,400 individual stops. So far this month, there have been less than 50 problems reported. Five years ago when we initiated a new trash program, there were hundreds of problems at start-up.

We expect the number to drop to near zero once our new service provider implements the improvements that we have worked out. Please continue to give us feedback regarding the trash program. Together, we will make it better.

HELPFUL HINTS FOR THE NEW TRASH PROGRAM

For your weekly trash pick-up:

Make sure trash is out by 7 a.m.

6 containers, bags or bundles of yardwaste per week

Please bag or bundle twigs and branches. It is extremely time-consuming to try and pull these things from the trash can.

If street-side is confusing because of your lot location, it might be helpful to put your address on your trash container. *For example, you may be on a flag lot.*

For your bi-weekly recycling pick-up:

Please note acceptable recycling items on the website.

Remember, sheet plastic is not recyclable, such as: newspaper bags, trash bags, etc. If you use plastic to protect your can, please fold it over and tape to keep plastic from recycling and so Waste Advantage (WA) knows that it is recycling material inside the can. Containers that have had food in them are not recyclable. Milk/juice containers and cans should be rinsed out before recycling.

Non-recyclables include: pizza boxes, margarine containers, microwave containers/take-out food, etc. These items would go in the regular trash.

Please place your recycle sticker on the side of the trash can for easy visibility.

For your monthly large item pick-up:

Please note the list of acceptable free pick up items on the website, www.pinery.org.

Call WA to notify them that you have a large item. This helps them know what volume to expect.

Carpet rolls, sod rolls, remodel/construction debris and wood require a special pick-up and are not eligible as free pick up items.

Equipment such as lawnmowers cannot be picked up at all – toxic waste laws.

Hot tubs are not acceptable for large item pick-up.

Avoid a Late Fee

Note due date on trash bill. Make sure your payment is received by the PHA or billing agency by that date.

Late fees are assessed at the end of the due date and a second billing is generated by the billing agency.

The billing agency then bills the PHA for the second billing.

The Timbers Development News *by Dave Kristick*

The Timbers Development is now processing sketch plans to complete construction for filings 30, 31 and 32 which are located close to residents in the Pinery. These filings are east of Ponderosa Way, north of Democrat Road including areas, which closely abut existing Pinery homes.

During the next two to four years, this area will be surveyed and laid out in detail to address utilities and construction phases for the completion of the Timbers Development. During this time period, surveys will be conducted and markers installed to identify locations of construc-

tion activities. In the past, many survey markers have been removed causing the Timbers undue costs for resurvey marker placements.

The Pinery Homeowners' Association, Inc. requests that all of our members and residents of this area refrain from moving or removing markers and report anyone doing so to the Douglas County Sheriff's Office and the PHA office. The Timbers has graciously allowed our residents and others to walk this private area since their project began while sustaining financial hardships doing so. As the process to build out this area begins, they

are requesting our assistance as a community to keep this area safe and free of criminal activity. The Timbers has filed a letter of intent to prosecute anyone trespassing or engaging in any criminal act with the Douglas County Sheriff's Office regarding this area.

Let's all be on the lookout for anyone abusing this area and reporting all acts of vandalism to the proper authorities when observed. This addition to the Pinery area will in many ways help to maintain and increase the property values of our homes and property so let's do our part to protect it.

Poacher in the Pinery Reward Fund

As noted in the March *Pinery Homeowner*, the Pinery area has recently been victimized by illegal shooting of deer. Through the Colorado Division of Wildlife **Operation Game Thief**, a reward fund is being established for information leading to the apprehension of the person or persons committing these crimes.

Online Predators—Protect Your Children

The arrest of a local man for contacting teens on the Internet brings the issue of online safety back into the headlines. The Internet is an invaluable tool, but there are serious dangers that need to be emphasized.

An **online predator** could be **anyone**. The Internet allows people to remain anonymous and does not prevent adults from lying about their age or intentions.

It's important to educate your children and teach them how to better protect themselves. The best way to help protect your children is by being involved and talking to them.

How do you help protect your children while online?

Prepare your children for the online world just as you would for the real world. Establish guidelines and

rules. Know who communicates with your children.

Learn about the Internet. Familiarize yourself with the programs your children are using. Consider using Internet filters and blocks.

Explain to your children that instant messaging (IM) is only for chatting with school and family friends they know by face and are approved by you.

Many incidents happen in chat rooms. Tell your children to say nothing in these chat rooms they wouldn't say in public. Reinforce that people are not always who they say they are when they chat online. Make sure your children know how dangerous it is to give out personal information such as their names, mailing addresses, or E-mail addresses.

Although the majority of children who use the Internet do not get into serious trouble, caution must be exercised while using this powerful and useful tool.

Douglas County Sheriff's Office has a School Liaison that is available to do Internet Safety presentations for students, parents, and teachers. There is a free software program that is offered to parents at these presentations. The software helps parents look at Internet activity on their home computer.
